### **INTRODUCTION**

On behalf of the men and women of the Bradley Police Department, I am pleased to present this 2011 Annual Report. Through hard work, vigilance and dedication to the department, this is the fifth year in a row that during the holiday season shopping period, there was no major crime committed. We are still facing an upswing in property related crimes, especially thefts and vehicle burglaries, and have made significant arrests with many of these cases.

Several accomplishments were achieved during the year, including the upgrade of the Communications Center, the purchase of P-25 compliant two-way mobile radios, upgraded video surveillance system around the facility, and various other facility improvements.

We also had one of the most successful National Night Out events, which included participation from all the metro area law enforcement agencies and well over three thousand people in attendance.



## ADMINISTRATION CHIEF OF POLICE



The Chief of Police has the overall responsibility for the administration of the Police Department. He has vested authority and responsibility to manage and supervise the activities and personnel of the department, establish goals, objectives and performance standards

Steven E. Coy was appointed Chief of Police on May 26, 2009 after serving as Deputy Chief of Police for nearly five years. Chief Coy is the only officer in the history of the Bradley Police Department to have served in all established ranks and capacities.

Chief Coy started his career with the Bradley Police Department in August 1979 as a Dispatcher and was a Police Cadet in the Kankakee Valley Emergency Youth Corps in the 1970's.

Chief Coy holds a B.S. in Public Safety
Management from Calumet College of St
Joseph, is a graduate of all Police Management
programs from Northwestern University for
Public Safety, and a graduate of the 213<sup>th</sup>
session of the FBI National Academy.

Chief Coy is a member and past president of the Bradley Historical Society, member of the 100 Club of Kankakee County, International Chief of Police Association, Illinois Chiefs of Police Association and the Eastern Illinois Law Enforcement Administrators Association. He also serves as President of the Kankakee County Police/Fire Memorial Committee, Board member of the Kankakee County ETSB-911, and Chairman of the Kankakee Metropolitan Enforcement Group (KAMEG) Policy Board.



### **ADMINISTRATION**

#### 2011 INTERNAL AFFAIRS INVESTIGATIONS

During 2011, the Department received and investigated six complaints against personnel as mandated by policy. Two complaints were unfounded, two complaints were not sustained, one complaint was exonerated and one complaint was withdrawn.

#### ADMINISTRATIVE SECRETARY

Teresa Richert has been with the Village of Bradley for twelve years and has been involved in many areas within the Village. She has been the Executive Secretary of the Village President for eight years, and is also the Accounts Payable and Payroll Clerk. Since early 2009 she has been assigned to the Administrative Secretary to the Police Department. Her responsibilities include, but are not limited to, payroll for the Village and time allocation, file coordination, maintenance of the purchase order system, false alarm and enforced mowing billing and collection, assistant to the Police & Fire Commission and other miscellaneous duties as assigned.

#### POLICE & FIRE CHAPLAIN

Rev. Hank Roso was appointed Police & Fire Chaplain in late 2002 and has been a great asset to the department and local area. The Chaplain is a vital part of the overall team and becomes involved whenever the need arises. He has become the 'go to' person during times of tragedy and discomfort.

Rev. Roso has volunteered his time and services for our Holiday Shopping Trip and is quick to arrive on scenes in the middle of a cold winters night with hot coffee he has set up in the back of his SUV. Hank also provides counseling or just an ear for when and if village personnel need to discuss or rational incidents with someone outside their agency.

### **PATROL DIVISION**



The Patrol Division of the Bradley Police Department consists of one Commander, 6 Sergeants and 20 Patrol Officers. The Patrol Division is the backbone of the Bradley Police Department. Its primary responsibilities include: The protection of life and property, the preservation of peace and order, the control and direction of traffic, the investigation of traffic crashes, the investigations of criminal acts in progress and the apprehension of criminals and the provisions of a myriad of other police services. These services include: Extra Patrol checks on businesses and residential dwellings, specialty vehicle patrol (HumV, ATV & Mountain Bike) and park checks. The Patrol Division provides twenty-four hour police service and respond to nearly 30843 emergency and non-emergency calls for service in 2011.

The Commander of the Patrol Division is Lt Michael Johnston. Since joining the department in 1996 he has served as School Resource Officer, Traffic Officer and Midnight Watch Commander as Sergeant prior to his current assignment. The Patrol Division patrols nearly seven (7) square miles within the Village of Bradley utilizing 3 patrol shifts. The 1st Shift 0645 – 1515 hours, 2nd Shift 1445 – 2315 hours and the 3rd Shift which runs 2245 – 0715 hours. The 30 minute overlap on each shift change allows for those officers coming on duty to attend Roll Call and receive daily briefings and training sessions. This overlap also ensures that there are always police officers available to respond to incidents despite shift changes. The officers assigned to a patrol shift now rotate days off on 5 on, 2 off, 5 on, 3 off; 15 days cycle of 8.5 hour shifts. During the officers' tour of duty they may be dispatched to calls involving burglaries, robberies, assaults, domestic violence, alarms, reports of drunk drivers, prowlers, traffic crashes and many other calls for service.





#### RECORDS DIVISION

Division has various responsibilities
critical to the proper functioning of
the police department. They
perform departmental law
enforcement record keeping, input
of computer data and general
clerical support duties, such as:

- •Processing of police reports, providing information to the Kankakee County State's Attorney, Courts and Juvenile Probation
- ·Maintain, control and purge police records
- •Input computer information concerning traffic citations
- Process and collect fines for parking and ordinance citations
- •Compile crime statistics for city, state and Federal agencies; locate and copy police report for individuals, private attorneys county agencies and insurance companies
- •Research records to assist other law enforcement agencies conducting background investigations and process subpoena requests
- •Assist the general public at the counter and over the phone

The Records Division will produce and record approximately 50 to 100 report copies a week for citizens and other requesting agencies. The processing and copy fee for Crash Report copies are \$5 while Case Reports cost \$2 each.

### **ADJUDICATION HEARINGS**


Since its inception in 2007 the Bradley Police Department has held its Parking, Code, and Local Ordinance citations (with exception of Alcohol Violations) hearings through our In-House Adjudication Hearing process. The Adjudication Hearing for the Village of Bradley take place the third Thursday of every month in the Village Council Chambers.

### **COMMUNICATIONS**



The Emergency Communications Center, also known as the 911 center, answers 911 and non-emergency calls for the Village of Bradley around-the-clock. Emergency communications personnel dispatch police, fire, emergency medical services, code enforcement and animal control calls for the community.



It is important that citizens use 911 for **immediate public safety assistance**. Non-emergency requests are handled by calling 815-933-3315

During 2011, the Communications Center equipment was upgraded which included new radio technology, and the addition of a third dispatch position. In addition, the Kankakee County ETSB erected a higher communication tower at the facility to improve communications and data flow between the area agencies.

The department also purchased new mobile two-way radios for the police vehicles, which are P25 compliant. The Bradley Police Department is the only local agency that has a back-up communications system and digital capability. Upgrades were also made to the outdoor warning sirens within the village to allow activation by KANCOM.



### **CRIMINAL INVESTIGATION UNIT**

The Criminal Investigations Unit is composed of three detectives and a Supervisor. These detectives have the responsibility of investigating felony and misdemeanor person and property crimes.



The detectives assigned to the criminal investigation unit are specially trained in one or more of the following areas: crime scene processing, forensic evidence, crimes against children and elderly and homicide investigation. At a major crime scene their function is primarily to collect all evidence, conduct interviews and interrogations to focus on developing a suspect. At each major crime scene one of the detectives is assigned as Lead Investigator. They are responsible for assessing all information received and collected, they may also assign duties to other team members. The Lead Investigator's role is rotated among those qualified to ensure they stay fresh and have equal opportunity to utilize their training and develop their investigative skills.

### **PROPERTY & EVIDENCE**

Property Officer John Boudreau oversees all Evidence Technicians, property and evidence submitted to the department. In addition to these tasks he is also responsible for the police fleet and its maintenance.

- \* An Audit of all drugs, money/valuables and weapons in police custody
- \* Streamlined and organized the property & evidence storage system
  - Relocated high security/high risk property to new secure locations (drugs, valuables, weapons and firearms)
  - Segregated all evidence regarding sex crimes, arson and death investigations (all evidence that can never be disposed of or destroyed by law)
- \* Illinois State Police Certified Crime Scene Investigator training in Springfield
- \* Reevaluation and reassessments of all fleet vehicles and their equipment

# <u>Drug Enforcement Administration's Prescription</u> <u>Drug "TAKE BACK" Program</u>



The Bradley Police Department, in partnership with Associate Counseling Center of Bradley and numerous other local law enforcement agencies, have taken an active role in the DEA's prescription drug "Take Back" program since its inception.

In 2011 two national dates were established for the "Take Back" of prescription drugs. On these dates (April 30<sup>th</sup> and October 29<sup>th</sup>) the public was encouraged to bring their unwanted prescription medications to the established collection point located in the parking lot of Associated Counseling Center at 300 N Kennedy Drive.

When citizens dropped off their unwanted medications they were given educational materials referencing the growing dangers of the abuse and improper disposal of prescription medications. Officers and other professionals were on hand at the site to assist and answer any questions that may arise.

This program was extremely successful yielding more than 15 large cases of prescription medications for each event. These drugs were then properly disposed of through the DEA thus protecting the environment and eliminating the risk of abuse by subjects.

The Bradley Police and other local law enforcement agencies continue their commitment to this program every day by providing prescription drop boxes located within their respective facilities for the disposal of any unwanted medications throughout the rest of the year.

The Bradley Police maintain their drop box in the front vestibule of the police station across from the telecommunications service window.




Sergeant's Joseph Martino and Craig Anderson received commendations from the Bradley Fire and Police Department for their actions in helping residents out of a house on fire.

Chief Coy and the Department received an award, "Patriotic Employer" from the National Employer Support of the Guard and Reserve, for employee support of participation in the National Guard.


